They were created by artist Michele Curtis, who was born and raised in Easton after her parents came to Bristol from Jamaica. The murals celebrate the rich history of the St Pauls Carnival and the contributions the Windrush Generation made to the local community and beyond.

Roy knew it wasn't fair that people with brown skin weren't allowed to be bus drivers, so in 1963 he organised lots of people across Bristol to get together to boycott buses and make change happen. 	Audley Evans was also a founder of the CCC and participated in the Bristol Bus Boycott. He was a skilled engineer, moving from Jamaica to Bristol and then on to America. A quiet and generous man, Audley always helped people as much as he could.	TICK WHEN SEEN
